VARIETY SUMMARY

- High yielding mid-long season APW & APWN wheat
- Solid grain package with low screenings and excellent grain size
- Good rust resistance to those strains common in Western Australia
- Broadly adapted to both acid and alkaline soils

 BREEDING

LongReach Envoy (LPB05-1157) is a cross made by David Bonnett in the GrainGene joint venture which was developed and evaluated by the LongReach Plant Breeders technical team led by Dr Bertus Jacobs.

 AREA OF ADAPTATION

LRPB Envoy is well adapted to the central region and south coast of Western Australia.

 MATURITY

Mid-long season in maturity ranging between Carnamah and Magenta.

 PLANT CHARACTERISTICS

Awne semi-dwarf, white chaff wheat with medium plant height at maturity. Mid-long season maturity suiting a May planting.

 DISEASE RESISTANCE

Provides good rust resistance to stripe, leaf and stem races common in Western Australia. LRPB Envoy is susceptible to Yellow leaf spot and Crown rot, moderately resistant to CCN and moderately tolerant to RLN (*P. thorneii*).

 GRAIN QUALITY

LRPB Envoy has APW classification in Western Australia and is also eligible for the APWN grade. LRPB Envoy has large plump grain and performs very well in tight finishes. Screenings, grain weight and test weight over a range of seasons and environments in Western Australia have been similar to Wyalkatchem.

 **PLANT BREEDER RIGHTS AND ROYALTIES**

LRPB Envoy is protected by Plant Breeders Rights. An End Point Royalty (EPR) of \$3.08 per tonne (GST inclusive), which includes breeder royalties, applies to this variety. The EPR revenue will be invested directly back into the LongReach Plant Breeders program.
